

FREDERICK A. BEE

Preemption- book C/page 214 6/24/1853

Frederick A. Bee- Personally appeared before me H. Doyle, an acting Justice of the Peace in and for the County of El Dorado aforesaid Frederick A. Bee, who being duly sworn says that he has taken up and claims for grazing and agricultural purposes the following tract or parcel of land situated near Placerville in the said county and more fully described as follows: commencing at the NE corner of the land claimed by Cunningham, running East parallel with the old road leading from Placerville to Coloma 34 rods to where the new Coloma road and the road leading from Placerville to the Chilian Bar intersects , thence South running parallel with the said Chilian Bar road 120 rods to where the new Coloma road intersect with said Chilian Bar road, thence West 45 rods on a line running parallel with the new Coloma road to Cunningham's SE corner, thence North along the line of said Cunningham" claim 120 rods to the place of beginning. Containing not to exceed 160 acs. of land.

That he has taken no other claim under the Act entitled "An act prescribing the mode of maintaining and defending possessory action on public land in this state and that to the best of his knowledge and belief said land is not claimed under any existing title excepting a claim taken up by Mess. Organ, Jackson and Murgotten in August of 1852 on this same piece or parcel of land which claim is relinquished to said F.A.Bee by a bill of sale bearing the date March 28, 1853.
