## Judge Sawyer's Body Borne to Rest

### Funeral Rites at Church and Grave.

#### The Eulogy Pronounced by Dr. Mackenzie—The Masonic Ceremonies.

What was mortal of Judge Lorenzo Sawyer now reposes in the family vault at Laurel Hill Cemetery. The remains were laid to rest yesterday afternoon with every possible mark of honor and respect due to the man and the high office he held, and with rites of the Masonic order. Previous to the Masonic ceremony at the grave, services over the remains were held at the First Congregational Church.

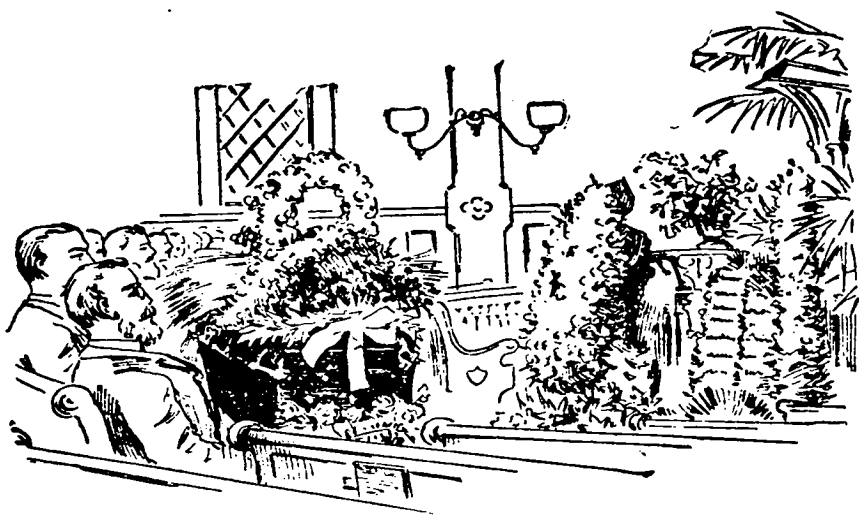
The attendance at the church embraced a large representation of the bar of California, the Masonic order, and leading citizens of all walks of life. Grand Master Reuben H. Lloyd led the Masonic delegation. Superior Judges Coffey, Wallace, Troutt, Finn, Hebbard, Garber, Lawler and Levy were present, as were M. M.

Rev. Dr. Mackenzie's sermon was very eloquent. "Judge Sawyer," said he, "belonged to a generation that has left its impress deep in the record of the history of our country and century. Some generations are historic because their mission has been one of destruction, but this generation has been greater than all because it has been constructive. But that generation is fast passing away. They came in twos and threes and genial companies, and together they looked upon the mountains and the sea. In twos and threes and genial companies they are passing away, and together they gaze for the first time upon the mountains and sea of another world. Let us not grudge them their promotion, nor mourn our own loss so much as to forget their gain. Gain? To pass through the stirring scenes of his time and place; to maintain the qualities worthy of a man unoppressed by any outward circumstance, upheld only by inward principle; to assume the balancing of right and wrong between contending men; to hold the fortune and the fame of his fellows in his hand unbiased by even the most laudable personal interest; to come in contact with what is base, selfish, combative and vindictive in man, and to become neither; to do this from year to year till seventy years of age, and to do so amid the temptations which only a lawyer and a judge can know—for such a man is gain in any possible world awaiting him on the other side of this unrepassable bourn."

#### Honored in Montana.

HELENA (Mont.), September 9. — A large gathering of the members of the Montana Bar Association was held to-day to pay tribute to the memory of Judge Sawyer. Judge Hiram Knowles of the United States Circuit Court and Colonel A. C. Botkin delivered memorial addresses, which were ordered spread on the minutes. All the courts adjourned in respect.
